Under the ONC Health IT Certification Program (Certification Program), health IT developers are required to conduct Real World Testing of their certified health IT (45 CFR 170.405). The Office of the National Coordinator for Health Information Technology (ONC) issues Real World Testing resources to clarify health IT developers' responsibilities for conducting Real World Testing, to identify topics and specific elements of Real World Testing that ONC considers a priority, and to assist health IT developers in developing their Real-World Testing plans and results reports.

[A Real World Testing plan template](#) was created to assist health IT developers in organizing the required information that must be submitted for each element in their Real World Testing plan. To accompany the plan template, ONC has also provided this results report template.

While the use of this template is voluntary, health IT developers may find it useful in preparing their Real World Testing results report(s). Health IT developers must submit one year of results to address the Real World Testing of eligible products as outlined in their previous year's Real World Testing plan(s). If adjustments to approaches are made throughout Real World Testing, the health IT developer should reflect these adjustments in their Real World Testing results report. ONC expects that the results report will include a list of these changes, the reasons for them, and how intended outcomes were more efficiently met as a result.

Consistent with the ONC’s recommendation that “Real World Testing verify that deployed Certified Health IT continues to **perform as intended by conducting and measuring observations of interoperability and data exchange**”, our original test plan focused on capturing and documenting the number of instances that certified capability was successfully utilized in the real world. In instances where no evidence exists due to low or zero adoption of a certified capability or the inability to capture evidence of successful use for other reasons, we tested and demonstrated the required certified capability in a semi-controlled setting as close to a “real world” implementation as possible.

As per the test plan, we leveraged a 3-fold approach to demonstrate successful real-world implementations.

- Adoption Rate
- Summative Testing
- Interactive Testing

Adoption rate was used to determine if/when certified capability is being used in the real world and to help identify differences in care settings. Evidence of high rates of implementation and usage indicate (but don't by themselves prove) a certified capability's usefulness and practical value. Evidence of low rates of implementation and usage might be accounted for by patient volume, location or provider preference among other reasons. Note, it is not the goal of this exercise to identify the individual causes of why a given certified capability may have a high or low adoption rate, but rather to identify the users and care settings for which a given test is relevant.

Summative assessments were used to measure which certified actions were performed at the conclusion of a given time period where the minimum time period was 90 days and longer where possible. These results are typically obtained by generating reports and examining audit logs from within the certified health IT module to help demonstrate the frequency of actions within the given time frame, and where possible, whether those actions were successful or unsuccessful. High success rates should be an indicator of a successful implementation of a given certified capability in a real-world setting.

Interactive testing was used to demonstrate conformance to requirements where the adoption rate of a given certified capability is zero and to demonstrate ongoing compliance with updated standards and code sets (SVAP). Interactive tests were live tested as opposed to examining historical usage statistics. The goal being to demonstrate the certified Health IT module being used in a way consistent within a practice or care setting.

This approach allowed for the successful testing and obtaining results for each criterion. Detailed below in the **Metrics and Outcomes** section the reader will find evidential data in the form of a Summative result(s) or Interactive test outcome for each certified criteria for the Enable Healthcare EHR.

### 170.315(b)(1) Transitions of care

Summary Description
<p><b>Pass</b>                      <b>Method:</b> Interactive Testing</p> <p>The purpose of this test was to show that providers can send and receive transition of care/referral summaries as C-CDA to/from external providers. During the year, examination of the log information will be performed for a minimum period of three (3) months to determine an appropriate sample for the 170.315(b)(1) criterion. Due to low or zero adoption of this criteria, Enable Healthcare demonstrated the module function in their system as an interactive test demonstrating a compliant result.</p>
Justification
<p>This criterion necessitates that a certified Health IT module be able to generate C-CDAs in accordance with predetermined standards and vocabulary code sets as well as transmit and receive C-CDAs. Moreover, Certification criteria 170.315(b)(1) is applicable for ambulatory care settings -Private Practice. MDNet CEHRT for such settings include eligible providers and other authorized users performing and fulfilling RWT functions for RWT testing. Obtaining copies of C-CDA records from outside providers who have no incentive to take part in this activity is not practical. As the certified capability must be available and effective regardless of how frequently it is utilised, we plan to demonstrate the necessary certified capabilities by showing how frequently C-CDAs are generated and exchanged with other systems. We anticipate that there will be a high success rate.</p>

### 170.315(b)(2) Clinical Information Reconciliation and Incorporation

Summary Description	
<b>Pass</b>	<b>Method:</b> Interactive Testing
<p>This test was designed to demonstrate the importability of C-CDA documents, their compatibility with patient charts, their ability to be reconciled, as well as the ability to create and export new C-CDA documents. During the year, examination of the log information will be performed for a minimum period of three (3) months to determine an appropriate sample for the 170.315(b)(2) criterion. Due to low or zero adoption of this criteria, Enable Healthcare demonstrated the module function in their system as an interactive test demonstrating a compliant result.</p>	
Justification	
<p>According to this criterion, a certified Health IT module must be able to match a C-CDA received from an external system to the appropriate patient, reconcile and incorporate clinical information from the patient's chart under the section "Medications", "Allergies," and "Problem Lists," and then incorporate the lists into the patient records. Each of these stages should ideally be completed electronically within a certified Health IT module. The majority of providers in the actual world often chose to carry out these processes manually and choose to save any externally received C-CDAs as attachments to the patient record, even though this certified capability is provided to our users. In order to prove the certified capability is available and useful, independent of the frequency it is used, we plan to track the frequency that providers are electronically reconciling and incorporating C-CDAs that were received from outside providers. We anticipate that providers will use their resources wisely and with a high success rate.</p>

### 170.315(b)(3) Electronic Prescribing

Summary Description	
<b>Pass</b>	<b>Method:</b> Summative Testing
<p>The purpose of this test was to show that providers have been given a functionality to create and transmit with track count of New-Rx e-prescriptions to surescripts and pharmacy using EHR over the course of time. During the year, examination of the log information will be performed for a minimum period of three (3) months to determine an appropriate sample for the 170.315(b)(3) criterion.</p>	
Justification	
<p>This criterion requires the ability of a certified Health IT module to perform prescription-related electronic transactions (eRx) using required standards. MDNet application supports Erx transmission to external pharmacies via Surescripts certified Health IT system. A successful Erx transmission to pharmacy indicates compliance to the underlying ONC criteria. Provider/authorized user can view Eprescription Tracker for count and details of Transmitted newRx, Delivered NewRx, Failed NewRx. This will indicate that the eRx transactions are delivered from the certified Health IT module and that the eRx clearinghouse successfully receives them. Certification criteria 170.315(b)(3) is applicable for ambulatory care settings -Private Practice. MDNet CEHRT for such settings include eligible providers and other authorized users performing and fulfilling RWT functions for RWT testing.</p>

## 170.315(b)(6) Data Export

Summary Description	
<b>Pass</b>	<b>Method:</b> Interactive Testing
<p>The purpose of this test was to show that authorized users have been given a functionality to automatically schedule export of data for all patients that represents the most current clinical information in the specified date and time range.</p> <p>During the year, examination of the log information will be performed for a minimum period of three (3) months to determine an appropriate sample for the 170.315(b)(3) criterion. Due to low or zero adoption of this criteria, Enable Healthcare demonstrated the module function in their system as an interactive test demonstrating a compliant result.</p>	
Justification	
<p>This criterion requires the ability of a certified Health IT module to export a summary of a patient's record in C-CDA format according to specified standards and vocabulary code sets. MDNet application supports a successful generation and transmission of export file C-CDA of single/multiple patients which indicates support and compliance to the underlying ONC criteria. Authorized Provider/user can configure options for data elements, real time, date and time range, and storage location using C-CDA Export tracker/Add new Export Summary in EHR. Certification criteria 170.315(b)(6) is applicable for ambulatory care settings -Private Practice. MDNet CEHRT for such settings include eligible providers and other authorized users performing and fulfilling RWT functions for RWT testing.</p>

## 170.315(c)(1-3) Clinical Quality Measures (CQMs)

Summary Description	
<b>Pass</b>	<b>Method:</b> Interactive Testing
<p>The purpose of this test is to show that users are allowed to record and export for selected measure, import and calculate the QRDA III for selected measure and Generate CQM files (QRDA category III for ambulatory measures in 170.205 (k)(3) and report for the applicable measure that was selected by the provider/practice.</p> <p>During the year, examination of the log information will be performed for a minimum period of three (3) months to determine an appropriate sample for the 170.315(c)(1-3) criterion.</p>	
Justification	
<p>170.315(c)(1) requires a certified Health IT module to record necessary numerator data points automatically or manually for eligible measures related to patient and patient population and export QRDA 1 for identified clinical quality measures for the practice/provider. 170.315(c)(2) requires a certified Health IT module must be to calculate and depict Total Patient Denominator Count, Numerator Count, Numerator Percentage, and Decile Value of each measure reported in accordance with MIPS CQM Specifications as per CMS guidelines, demonstrating successful interoperability and functionality in production environment. 170.315(c)(3) count and list of electronic-Clinical Quality Measures (eCQMs) which are calculated and submitted to CMS for CMS Quality Reporting and Value-Based Program. Provider can record numerator for the displayed measures for a patient/patient population in EHR. System calculates the scores for numerator, denominator automatically based on current year decile scoring criteria in MIPS Dashboard in EHR. Provider can import QRDA received from an external system and calculate the measure. (HL7 QRDA Category 1 Release 3 for one or multiple patients to perform calculations on the CQMs that providers are attesting. MDNet CEHRT for such settings include eligible providers and other authorized users performing and fulfilling RWT functions for RWT testing.</p>

### 170.315(e)(1) View, Download, and Transmit to 3rd Party

Summary Description	
<b>Pass</b>	<b>Method:</b> Interactive Testing
<p>The purpose of this test is to show that this functionality allows Patient and their authorized representatives can access their patient portal and view, download and transmit Common Clinical Data set to a 3rd party.</p> <p>During the year, examination of the log information will be performed for a minimum period of three (3) months to determine an appropriate sample for the 170.315(e)(1) criterion.</p>	
Justification	
<p>According to this criterion, a certified health IT module must be able to offer patients and their authorised representatives access to their patient portals where they can view, download, and send Common Clinical Data sets in C-CDA format to a third party using either encrypted or unencrypted transmission methods. According to the patient's activities, the system updates the status of the CCD Export Summary Document as Seen, Downloaded, or Sent after they log in to their PHR account and access the Clinical Summary or Summary of Care Record. With PHR Activity Tracker in EHR, the system keeps track of the number of patients registered in PHRs and supports Status, Error, and Verify transactions through Data Transportation Tracker available in PHR. Thus, MDNet CEHRT for such settings include eligible providers and other authorized users performing and fulfilling RWT functions for RWT testing.</p>

### 170.315(f)(1) Transmission to Immunization Registries

Summary Description	
<b>Pass</b>	<b>Method:</b> Summative Testing
<p>The purpose of this test was to show that the EHR allows providers to create and transmit immunization information (historical and newly administered vaccines) to Immunization registry using CVX and NDC codes.</p> <p>During the year, examination of the log information will be performed for a minimum period of three (3) months to determine an appropriate sample for the 170.315(f)(1) criterion.</p>	
Justification	
<p>MDNet application supports a user to request, access and display the evaluated immunization history and forecast from an immunization registry for a patient in accordance with the HL7 2.5.1 standard, the HL7 2.5.1. IG for Immunization Messaging, Release 1.5, and July 2015 Addendum. A successful secure transmission to immunization registry and public agencies indicates compliance to the underlying ONC criteria. Provider/Authorizer user can create immunization information for a patient in immunization history module in patient chart in EHR. Thus, MDNet CEHRT for such settings include eligible providers and other authorized users performing and fulfilling RWT functions for RWT testing.</p>

170.315(f)(2) Transmission to Public Health Agencies — Syndromic Surveillance

**Summary Description**

**Pass**                      **Method:** Interactive Testing

The purpose of this test was to show that the EHR allows providers to send real-time, electronic syndromic surveillance data to a state syndromic surveillance system using data standards SNOMED CT and ICD 10 codes.

During the year, examination of the log information will be performed for a minimum period of three (3) months to determine an appropriate sample for the 170.315(f)(2) criterion. Due to low or zero adoption of this criteria, Enable Healthcare demonstrated the module function in their system as an interactive test demonstrating a compliant result.

**Justification**

The Syndromic Surveillance use case sets forth requirements for providers to send real-time, electronic syndromic surveillance data to a state syndromic surveillance system. The Health IT Module enables a user to record, select and transmit the syndromic surveillance data elements for a patient in accordance with the HL7 2.5.1 standard. A successful secure transmission to HIN and public health registry and public agencies indicates meaningful use and compliance to the underlying ONC criteria. System can transmit patient's immunization information to state immunization registries electronically (example NJIIS, CIR) and track in Interface/Immunization tracker in EHR. System can transmit patient's syndromic surveillance data information to HIN and public health registries electronically using HL7 data standards as syndromic messages. Thus, MDNet CEHRT for such settings include eligible providers and other authorized users performing and fulfilling RWT functions for RWT testing

### 170.315(g)(7) Application Access — Patient Selection

Summary Description	
<b>Pass</b>	<b>Method:</b> Interactive Testing
<p>The purpose of this test is to show that when external vendor query the patient using MDNet API and retrieves the patient record, system can receive a request with sufficient information to uniquely identify a patient and return an ID or token that can be used by an application to subsequently execute requests for that patient's data using FHIR specifications.</p> <p>During the year, examination of the log information will be performed for a minimum period of three (3) months to determine an appropriate sample for the 170.315(g)(7) criterion. Due to low or zero adoption of this criteria, Enable Healthcare demonstrated the module function in their system as an interactive test demonstrating a compliant result.</p>	
Justification	
<p>MDNET supports providers are able to retrieve patient information of single and multiple patients using standard API service for patient information exchange for purposes of the measurement under the Health Information Exchange objective. A successful secure and trusted API transaction between MDNet and external application indicates compliance to the underlying ONC criteria.
